Unstable lie of the fetus If the lie is longitudinal > Normal labour management . If the lie is not longitudinal > Consider external version to correct lie > A stabilising ARM should be done with caution > Bladder distention can cause a changing fetal lie; encourage the woman to void before performing any procedures

Fetal lie refers to the relationship between the long axis of the fetus with respect to the long axis of the mother. The possibilities include a longitudinal lie, a transverse lie, and, on occasion, an oblique lie. Fetal presentation is a reference to the part of the fetus that is overlying the maternal pelvic inlet.

Abnormalities of Lie / Presentation

Umbilical Cord Prolapse ... With transverse, oblique or unstable lie, ... vasospasm preventing venous and arterial blood flow to and from the fetus. There is a paucity of long-term follow-up data of babies born alive after cord prolapse in both hospital and community settings.

Unstable Lie . This term is applied when the lie which should be stable as longitudinal at 36 weeks of pregnancy is found to vary from one examination to the other – breech, vertex or should er. Causes · Any condition which increases mobility of the fetus in utero e.g. o Polyhydramnios, Fetal

Transverse Lie/ Shoulder Presentation: Causes, Diagnosis ...

The other important diagnosis to consider is unstable lie. This is where the presentation of the fetus changes from day-to-day (and can include breech presentation). Unstable lie is more likely if there is known polyhydramnios or the woman is multiparous.

What Does ‘Unstable Lie’ Mean? - Great Expectations

The surgeon may be able to rotate the fetus through the wall of the uterus once the abdominal wall has been opened. Otherwise, a transverse uterine incision is needed to gain access to a fetal pole. Internal podalic version is no longer attempted. Transverse lie is associated with a risk of cord prolapse of up to 20%.

In obstetrics, the presentation of a fetus about to be born specifies which anatomical part of the fetus is leading, that is, is closest to the pelvic inlet of the birth canal. According to the leading part, this is identified as a cephalic, breech, or shoulder presentation. A malpresentation is any presentation other than a vertex presentation (with the top of the head first).
