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### United States Antitrust Law And

In the United States, antitrust law is a collection of federal and state government laws that regulates the conduct and organization of business corporations, generally to promote competition for the benefit of consumers. The main statutes are the Sherman Act of 1890, the Clayton Act of 1914 and the Federal Trade Commission Act of 1914.

The Antitrust Laws Congress passed the first antitrust law, the Sherman Act, in 1890 as a "comprehensive charter of economic liberty aimed at preserving free and unfettered competition as the rule of trade." In 1914, Congress passed two additional antitrust laws: the Federal Trade Commission Act, which created the FTC, and the Clayton Act.

Swift & Co. v. United States, 196 U.S. 375 (1905) the antitrust laws entitled the federal government to regulate monopolies that had a direct impact on commerce Northern Securities Co. v. United States, 193 U.S. 197 (1904) 5 to 4, a railway monopoly, formed through a merger of 3 corporations was ordered to be dissolved.

Antitrust Law Definition. Antitrust laws are statutes or regulations designed to promote free and open markets. Also called "competition laws," antitrust laws prohibit unfair competition. Competitors in an industry cannot use certain tactics, such as market division, price fixing, or agreements not to compete.

Antitrust laws are acts adopted by the U.S. Congress to restrict unfair or monopolistic trade practices. The laws all share the same basic objective – to ensure free trade and a competitive economy by preventing price fixing and unlawful restraint of trade; and to encourage healthy competition and improved market efficiency.
